In 2025, Catholic Education Week will unfold under the theme "Pilgrims of Hope," inviting our school community to reflect on their journeys of faith and the transformative power of hope in their lives. Daily activities will include themed lessons that emphasize the significance of hope in Scripture and in the lives of saints. Catholic Education Week will be a week full of activities, prayers, reflections, and celebrations of the gift of Catholic Education that we are blessed to have here at St. Jerome. Our students along with staff will be involved in activities which will provide an opportunity for all to reflect upon and celebrate the privilege of Catholic Education.

During this week we will: gather for a school-wide liturgy, take part in daily Christian meditation, listen to Christian music during morning announcements and school wide retreat and/or activities.

Many activities from this week will be taken from the Ontario Catholic School Trustees' Association website (OCSTA) which provides our Catholic schools with a Resource kit to help schools prepare for Catholic Education Week. We will use these resources as well as develop our own to help the students understand what it means to understand We are called to Love.

Faith Formation:

Forming ourselves in our Catholic faith is a foundational element in helping each of us understand and live in the example of Christ.

Social Justice / Outreach Activities / Charities:

Catholic Social Teachings of the Church root our actions in supporting human dignity and the preferential option of the poor which calls us to serve the most vulnerable in the world.

Our school community contributes to a variety of social justice causes, and charitable outreach programs. Our contributions range from monetary donations as well as awareness and informational campaigns. These programs include: food drives at Christmas and Easter, for the St. Vincent de Paul Christmas Family Support, Christmas Collections, Hard Candy and Toiletry Collection for CFFC, Poppy Donation, ShareLife Campaigns through spirit weeks and special days, Geronimo's Dream, Terry Fox Walk, Canadian Cancer Society, CFFC volunteering for the Grade 8's, Dr. Simone – Blessings in a box and Jump Rope for Heart. In consultation with our Peel Public Health Nurse, Our Eco-Team focuses on those initiatives that support stewardship such as: "The Big Gulp", waste audits, battery recycling and planting gardens.

Recognizing Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations:

Framed by the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations (OCSGE), our graduates will be effective communicators, reflective thinkers, lifelong learners, collaborative contributors, caring family members, responsible citizens and discerning believers formed in the Catholic faith community.

A Discerning Believer: Students participate in monthly virtues assemblies, social justice initiatives, Christian Meditation, school masses and sacramental preparation, daily prayers, visible signs of our faith (sacred spaces and crucifixes) are found throughout school.

An Effective Communicator: Students have the opportunity to participate in Eco School, OPHEA Healthy Schools Certification, PALS, Choir, the Arts, Sports, Wellness Ambassadors, YFAs to promote a caring, inclusive school that celebrates diversity, embraces social justice initiatives and evangelizes the teachings of Jesus.

A Reflective, Creative and Holistic Thinker: Student learning is celebrated throughout school and showcased during Open House, Christmas Concert or School Play, Catholic Education Week, FDK year-end celebrations, Grade 8 graduation and Grade 2 & 7 Sacramental preparation, Crowning of Mary in May/Rosary Apostolates' Program. Students are expected to follow the Catholic Code of Conduct and through progressive discipline, reflect on making good choices. PALS, YFAs, WITS and Virtues assemblies are vehicles, which support our safe

and inclusive school initiatives and guide students to making good choices modeled on Jesus' actions.

A Self-Directed, Responsible, Life Long Learner: All diverse learners are encouraged to work to their full potential and be reminded of their God-given talents, which are showcased throughout the year during Bullying Awareness Week, Black History Month, Open House, Christmas Concert or School Play, Catholic Education Week, FDK year-end celebrations, Grade 8 graduation and Sacramental preparation, as well as opportunities to participate in extra-curricular activities.

A Collaborative Contributor: PALS, YFAs, WITS, and Virtues assemblies and liturgies, and are vehicles, which support our safe school initiatives and guide students to making good choices modeled on Jesus' actions.

A Caring Family Member: Students participate in monthly virtues assemblies, social justice initiatives, food drives, school masses and sacramental preparation, and daily prayers/Christian Meditation. PALS, YFAs, WITS and Virtues assemblies, fundraising for Terry Fox and ShareLife provide students with opportunities to apply Jesus' teachings to a wider community and witness the connection between School-Home and Parish.

A Responsible Citizen: Students are expected to follow the Catholic Code of Conduct and through progressive discipline, reflect on making good choices. PALS, CCCCAT, YFAs, WITS and Virtues assemblies are vehicles, which support our safe and inclusive school initiatives and guide students to making good choices modeled on Jesus' actions.

Celebrating Virtues:

A virtue is a habit or established capacity to perform good actions according to a moral standard. When we practice these virtues, we strengthen them and thereby make the presence of God more and more visible in the world around us.

Each month we highlight the Virtue of the month in a school wide liturgy and virtue assembly where we celebrate the classroom virtue winners with certificates. Each morning during our morning virtual announcements we share the virtue of the month and give connections and advice to reflect on our own lives and how to live the virtue in relation to others around us.. Our alter is used to display artifacts and information about each virtue and we use our morning prayers, the school weekly, the school website to highlight the virtue that we are

focusing on to the greater school community. School Masses and Liturgies are two areas where our virtues come to life within our school community.

Parents/Guardians and family members are invited to celebrate the Virtue of the month as recipients from each class receive recognition for demonstrating the Virtue in their daily actions.

Visible Signs of our Faith:

Through symbol and service, we are instruments of God's love whose work within our communities stands as a witness to our faith.

At St. Jerome, we welcome the community with a faith filled foyer displaying a sacred space/altar, which reflects the liturgical season cloth, the month's virtue, a large cross and the Holy Bible and the We All Belong and OSCGE banners. Each classroom has a sacred space which reflects the liturgical calendar and a cross. Daily prayers are read by students during our morning announcements. Our students and staff live our faith in their actions. We remind students to follow the WWJD (What Would Jesus Do) mantra.
